EHS ISD Police Department

The implementation of a district police department the fall is another important move to Author increase safety measures in our district. Chief Charlie Ruminiz has hared highly-skilled officers for EMS BD that are being minied specifically in work in inducits and provide a school-specific crisis migones. The EMS BD Police will contained to calaborate with bee enforcement in the crisis of Part Morth, Tagrow, and Bate Moard, as well in Terrare County, to provide support and access the abditional resources when needed. Officers will be assigned to middle and high schools, and additional officers will be assigned to partial in and around every alimentary campus each whool day Our district Security Specialists will also cantinee to serve and support all campuses.

Standard Response Protocols

EP65 ISD has adopted the Standard Response Protocol in the Destructive envergency response proceedance for all EP65 ISD valueds and facilities. Adopting this protocol instances that envergency personnel and the district are using the same language in envergency situations. These protocols include Secure, Loodoven, Evicates, Stefan, and Hald. Compares and facilities practice these drifts regularly to ensure that students and staff are propriet of in envergency.

Specialized Training for All Staff

All DPS BD pallet officers will be trained in protocols specific for first responders to active theorem statistics. The Advanced Law Enforcement Papel Response Training (ALERRT) is considered the national standard in active decotor response training by the Nelsral Bareau of Inectogetos. Chall Ramora is a confide ALERRD CRASE trainer and he, along with the Sagrow Falce Department and Training Low College Law Enforcement Academy, socialized the others wrates of this training called CRASE - Collan Response to Active Shoeau Elevents. All EPIS ID trachers and school staff participated in this training in August 2023 prior to the start of school.

Physical Barriers

Physical harviers are a key deterrent to any active threat. These include additional security tameras and monitors, door locks, controlled access points and exterior perimeter fension; in summer 2022, every control in the district was checked for humotionality and 600 additional camera were added to our security neutroning system. Policies and procedures were also aphted to require chairsour doors to be lacked when students are present for instruction during the regular shaled do. This is to previous expediency in reveng to a lockdown situation should the need arise. Exterior doors will be monitained throughout the day and all visitors will be required to enter through the threat office, must be "histori in" before gaining access, and must prevent a visit deterfacient card to be on campus.

Threat Assessment

Mental bealth continues to be a focus and our district counseling team works closely with campus and district leaders to built support plans for individuals and to montain for behaviors that have the potential to excitate. The beat defense is to stop a threat before it happens, and our mental health and threat assessment systems are critical components of our overall safety plan.

- Desktop computers are gradually decreasing and replacement is determined for need and utilization

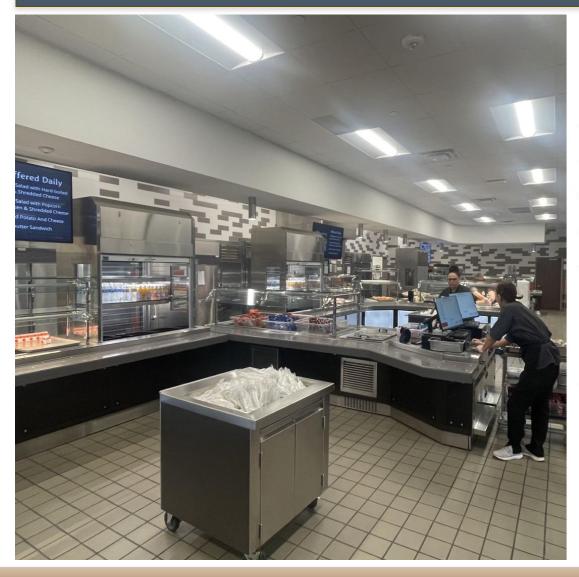

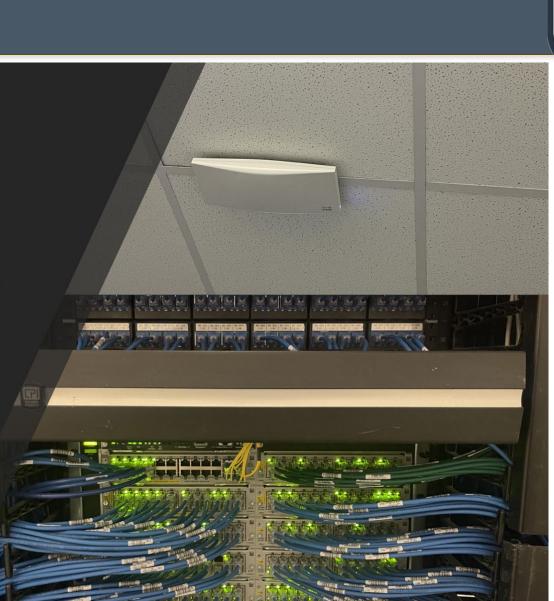

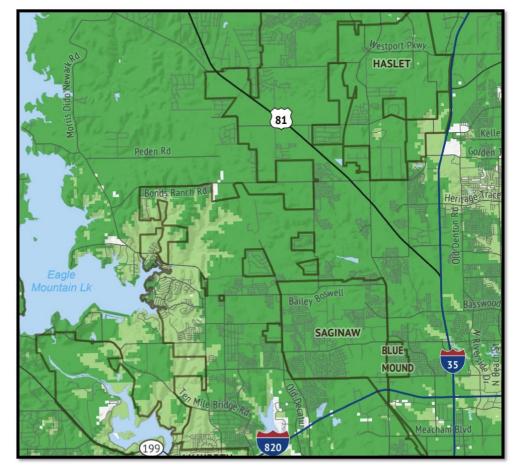

 - \$3,048,026 in Category 2 funding available to use now through the 2025 funding year. Any funds not used by the 2025 funding year will disappear.
 - \$2,032,017 Matching funds are needed to utilize all of the Category 2 funds

Meeting Summary & Talking Points



- Facility Planning Committee Co-Chair Blake Mabry welcomed the group to the April 6 meeting; he reminded everyone of the meeting norms and the committee's charge.
- Lauren Brown of VLK Architects was present to give the FPC an update on EMS ISD's state-required Long-Range Facility Plan.
- Matt Gamble of Baselice & Associates shared an overview of results from the recent facility planning community survey. Key takeaways from the survey results show that respondents have a positive image of EMS ISD; they believe safety & security as the most important issue; only 12 percent selected "addressing enrollment growth" as the most important issue, but 61% say the district needs more schools and classrooms; of three bond amounts tested, \$400M is most preferred; the tax rate was the reason most gave for opposing a bond election and only 29% believe it won't lead to a property tax rate increase.
- Program reviews were provided by EMS staff on the topics of safety & security, maintenance & transportation, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, and technology. (see full presentation for details).
- Subcommittees were reminded that their presentations to the full FPC will be on the May 4 agenda; a template to guide these presentation formats will be sent to subcommittee leaders.
